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OMPASSION! What is that? Is it just showing sympathy and empathy? Assuredly,

while these human feelings are relevant, they are not enough. They must be accompanied by action designed to change the plight of the person to whom the sympathy and empathy are directed.

On one occasion during Jesus' earthly ministry, a young lawyer asked Him this question: "And who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29) In His response, Jesus—avoiding the paralysis of analysis—laid out a scene that took place on a dangerous road, leading from Jerusalem to Jericho.

In his travel, a certain man encountered thieves, who stripped him of his clothes, and wounded him to the point of unconsciousness. By chance, two travelers <u>—a Levite</u> and a priest—on seeing the man, passed by on the other side.

Thereafter, a certain Samaritan came by. When he saw the man, he had compassion on him. That compassion moved him to render the necessary first aid before putting him on his donkey and taking him to an inn for further treatment. (Luke 10:31-35)

Significantly, and in contrast to the Levite and priest, the Samaritan's feelings of sympathy and empathy were accompanied by self-less actions that changed the plight of the man. Indeed, compassion is what compassion does.

As in all other areas of life, Jesus is the prime example in respect of this matter of compassion. As our theme puts it: "JESUS, THE GOD OF COMPASSION." The writings of the four gospels are replete with stories that demonstrate that Jesus' ministry went far beyond a cold sense of duty. It was filled with compassion for the plight of people from all walks of life. And so many lives were changed.

Could this be the missing link in our ministry today?
